HEALTH BULLETIN Rota virus (virus)

Diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, and dehydration in some cases. **Symptoms:**

How It Is Spread: Rotavirus is spread through the fecal-oral route.

Incubation: 2-4 days

Before diarrhea begins until 3 weeks after the illness. Communicable Period:

Provide information to the school regarding the nature of the Control: condition. Exclude your child from school if stool cannot be

contained in a diaper or "accident" or occurring for toilet-trained children, ther e is blood or mucous in the stool,

stool frequency is 2 or more than normal, stool is black or pale, child has dry mouth and eyes, child fails to urinate for 8 hours, or child has yellowish skin or eyes.

Suggested Treatment: See physician for recommended treatment.

Practice good hand washing techniques, particularly after **Prevention:** coughing and sneezing. Sanitize contaminated items/surfaces and dispose of tissues containing nose and throat secretions.
